Figuring out how to coexist with your dog can be a challenge.

With our "We Train, You Train" program, we can help you help your dog finally "get it"!

This obedience training program assists you in training, teaching manners & obedience, and problem solving when "dog issues" come up at home or when you are out and about.

How Does It Work?

- Select 3 days (over a 1-2 week period) for us to pull your dog out of daycare for an hour-long obedience training session. We will work with your dog on the problems you have identified.
- Select a 4th date for you, the human, to meet with us so we can teach you some of the techniques to work with your dog and get better results. After all, the most important thing is if your dog will perform well for you, not just the trainer. *This one-on-one knowledge transfer session is the most important part of "We Train, You Train"!*
- As the saying goes, focus on progress, not perfection. Just as it has likely taken time for your dog's unpleasant behavior to develop, it will take time to teach new ways to do things and access new pathways in the brain. So you can repeat "We Train, You Train" to continue to get results!
